Omar

This world premiere opera is based on the life of Omar Ibn Said, an enslaved Muslim African sold in Charleston in 1807. The work (music and libretto by Rhiannon Giddens; co-composed by Michael Abels) follows Ibn Said's spiritual journey from his life in Senegal to his enslavement in the Carolinas. (May 22, 25, 28, 31, June 3, 7; College of Charleston Sottile Theatre)

Musical Theater

Romantics Anonymous

Director Emma Rice's work returns to the Festival with *Romantics Anonymous*, a musical (produced by Plush Theatricals in association with Wise Children) adapted from the French-Belgian film $Les\ Emotifs$ *Anonymes* with music and lyrics by Christopher Dimond and Michael Kooman. (May 21 – 25, 27 – 31, June 2 – 7; Dock Street Theatre)

Until the Flood

In the months after the shooting of teenager Michael Brown, Dael Orlandersmith traveled to Ferguson, Missouri, to interview community members about the event and the social unrest that followed. In this one-woman play, Orlandersmith portrays eight characters with a broad range of perspectives inspired by her interviews. (May 22 – 26; Emmett Robinson Theatre at College of Charleston)

Sea Sick

Produced by Theatre Centre and making its US premiere at Spoleto, *Sea Sick* is a one-woman performance based on journalist Alanna Mitchell's bestselling book about climate change and its devastating effects on the global ocean. (May 27 – 30; Woolfe Street Playhouse)

Wonders at Dusk

An acclaimed illusionist, mentalist, and performance artist, Scott Silven blends storytelling, theater, and illusion for an hour-long immersive and mesmerizing performance. (June 1 – 7; Woolfe Street Playhouse)

The Believers Are But Brothers

Written and performed by Javaad Alipoor, *The Believers Are But Brothers* follows three men's journeys to online radicalization. Through the work itself and the use of WhatsApp, Alipoor invites the audience to engage with the resentment and violence that frame the international crisis of masculinity and the toxic underground networks of the internet it breeds. Meow Meow

Evening cabaret performances from singer, dancer, and actress Meow Meow (with an accompanying pianist) showcase her incredible vocal range, humor, and impeccable timing. (May 22 – 26; Woolfe Street Playhouse)

Scottish Ballet

Returning to Spoleto with American choreographer Helen Pickett's *The Crucible*, Scotland's national ballet company performs this exciting story ballet based on Arthur Miller's masterpiece with new music by Peter Salem. (May 22 – 24; Charleston Gaillard Center)

Caleb Teicher & Company

This acclaimed tap dance ensemble performs *Bzzzz* and *Variations*, two innovative works from award-winning choreographer Caleb Teicher that mine America's rich music and dance traditions and reflect his joyful and spirited tap dance style. (May 28 – 31; Emmett Robinson Theatre at College of Charleston)

Trisha Brown Dance Company

The post-modern dance company returns to Spoleto for two distinct performance experiences: *Trisha Brown: In Plain Site* presents outdoor site-specific iterations of Brown's early works that are free and open to the public; while the repertory program offers *Foray Forêt*, *Groove and Countermove*, and *Working Title* in a traditional theater setting. (May 28; Hampton Park; May 29, 30; College of Charleston Sottile Theatre)

Ballet Flamenco Sara Baras

In her latest work, *Sombras (Shadows)*, flamenco master Sara Baras, who is known for the style of la farruca—a dance of rapid-fire footwork traditionally performed by men—makes the technique completely

her own. (June 6, 7; Charleston Gaillard Center)

Bringing the US premiere of $Out\ of\ Chaos$, this Australian contemporary circus arts company has had sold-out Spoleto runs in 2014 and 2018. The ensemble's newest work is described by the artists as "our boldest and most ambitious yet." (May 22-26; Memminger Auditorium)

Machine de Cirque

This Quebec-based physical theater ensemble makes its Spoleto Festival USA debut with the US premiere of $La\ Galerie$ —a whimsical piece that takes viewers on a wild ride behind the scenes of an art gallery. (June 2 – 7; Memminger Auditorium)

Bank of America Chamber Music

Festival Director of Chamber Music Geoff Nuttall directs and hosts this series comprising 11 programs, each performed three times, featuring beloved classics and bright contemporary pieces. Composer in residence Jessica Meyer debuts a world premiere written for the St. Lawrence String Quartet, which celebrates its 25th season at Spoleto. Other works include Beethoven's Septet in E-flat major and Schubert's double cello quintet. (May 22 – June 7; Dock Street Theatre)

Music in Time: Difficult Grace

Cellist Seth Parker Woods features in this new-music concert featuring Fredrick Gifford's *Difficult Grace*, along with selections by Monty Adkins, Nathalie Joachim, Chinary Ung, and the US premiere of Fausto Romitelli's *Your Time Is Over*. (May 23; Simons Center Recital Hall at College of Charleston)

Music in Time: Distress to Serenity

Led by Festival Resident Conductor and Director of Orchestral Activities John Kennedy, members of the Spoleto Festival USA Orchestra perform works by up-an-coming international composers including Clifton Guidry, Žibouklė Martinaitytė, Bergrún Snæbjörnsdóttir, and Derek Tywoniuk. Get Out

For this live concert performance of *Get Out*, the 2017 Universal Pictures film is shown on a large screen as the Spoleto Festival USA Orchestra performs Michael Abels's score, conducted by Abels himself. (May 26; Charleston Gaillard Center)

Westminster Choir Concerts

The chorus in residence at Spoleto Festival USA since 1977, the ensemble—led by Festival Director of Choral Activities Joe Miller—celebrates its 100th anniversary with a program including Benjamin Britten's *Hymn to St. Cecilia* and works by Paweł Łukaszewski, Daniel Elder, and Jake Runestad, as well as favorites from Westminster's vast repertory. (May 23, 30; St. Matthew's Lutheran Church)

The Planets

Under the baton of Charleston native Jonathon Heyward, the Spoleto Festival USA Orchestra performs Holst's *The Planets*; "Rhapsodic Overture" by Edmund Thornton Jenkins, born in Charleston in 1894; and Lizst's Piano Concerto no. 1, featuring Charlestonian Micah McLaurin. (May 30; Charleston Gaillard Center)

The Stations

Members of the Westminster Choir perform settings from Carlo Gesualdo's *Responsoria* as they lead audience members through Memminger Auditorium. Each selection is paired with an image from photographer Tom Kiefer's series, *The American Dream*. (May 29, 31; Memminger Auditorium)

Four Seasons Recomposed

In a concert conducted by Festival Resident Conductor and Director of Orchestra Activities John Kennedy, members of the Spoleto Festival USA Orchestra perform *Recomposed by Max Richter: Vivaldi – The Four Seasons.* (June 1; Charleston Gaillard Center)

Beethoven's Ninth Symphony

Marking the 250th anniversary of Ludwig van Beethoven's birth, the Spoleto Festival USA Orchestra, Westminster Choir, and Charleston Symphony Orchestra Chorus join forces under the baton of German conductor Ruth Reinhardt for a performance of Beethoven's final symphony. (June 4; Charleston Gaillard Center)

Live from Here with Chris Thile

Produced by American Public Media, this variety show features a unique blend of musical performances, comedy, and audience interaction. During each live broadcast, MacArthur Fellow Chris Thile welcomes a wide range of well-known and up-and-coming talent to the stage. Guest artists to be announced this spring. (June 6; TD Arena at College of Charleston)

The War and Treaty

Named the Americana Music Awards' Best Emerging Artist in 2019, The War and Treaty—Michael and Tanya Trotter—culminate Spoleto's 2020 season with an outdoor evening concert, held for the first time at the College of Charleston Cistern Yard. The Wells Fargo Cistern Finale begins at 8:30pm. (June 7; College of Charleston Cistern Yard)

Wells Fargo Jazz

Preservation Hall Jazz Band

A torchbearer of New Orleans jazz for more than 50 years, the septet released its latest album, *So It Is*, in 2017. Reinvigorated by the post-Katrina rebuilding of their beloved home city, Preservation Hall Jazz Band aims to uphold the city's sonic traditions while continually revitalizing them with fresh ideas. (May 22; College of Charleston Cistern Yard)

A New Orleans Jazz Celebration

Dr. Michael White leads this eight-piece star-studded tribute to legendary guitarist and banjoist Danny Barker, an artist, writer, bandleader, and educator largely responsible for a resurgence in the New Orleans brass band tradition in the 1970s. (May 23; College of Charleston Cistern Yard)

Aruán Ortiz and Don Byron Duo

Cuban-born and rising-star pianist Aruán Ortiz teamed up with trailblazing New York-born clarinetist/saxophonist Don Byron for the critically acclaimed 2018 album *Random Dances and (A)tonalities*, "an exhilarating dialogue that transcends generational and geographic boundaries" (*Billboard*). (May 24 – 27; Simons Center Recital Hall at College of Charleston)

Two Wings: The Music of Black America in Migration

Produced by MacArthur Fellow and pianist Jason Moran and famed mezzo-soprano Alicia Hall Moran, this multifaceted program delves into the harrowing and inspiring stories from the Great Migration. Guest artists in Charleston include filmmaker and writer Julie Dash, singer/composer Toshi Reagon, and the ensemble Imani Winds. (May 27; Charleston Gaillard Center)

The Cookers

A supergroup of seven jazz icons combined to form one of the finest straight-ahead jazz bands today, The Cookers have worked together for the past 12 years. The group performs worldwide and recently released their fifth album, *The Call of the Wild and Peaceful Heart*. (May 28; College of Charleston Cistern Yard)

Abdullah Ibrahim and Ekaya

Named a 2019 NEA Jazz Master, pianist and composer Abdullah Ibrahim embarks on a rare world tour with his longtime band, Ekaya. Born and raised in Cape Town, South Africa, Ibrahim became an anti-apartheid activist who later performed during Nelson Mandela's inauguration. (June 2; College of Charleston Sottile Theatre)

Linda May Han Oh and Fabian Almazan

This cutting-edge duo—Australian bassist Linda May Han Oh and Cuban American pianist Fabian Almazan—make their Spoleto debuts exploring the sonic possibilities with Oh on the electric and acoustic bass (and vocals) and Almazan imaginatively sculpting the sound of an acoustic piano. (June 3 – 6; Simons Center Recital Hall)

Tracing the overlooked movement of sounds from Africa and the Arabic world and their influence on European and American music, Rhiannon Giddens and Francesco Turrisi play selections from their 2019 album, *there is no Other*. (May 24; College of Charleston Cistern Yard)

The Wood Brothers

Dubbed "masters of soulful folk" by *Paste*, this Grammy nominated trio—Oliver and Chris Wood and Jano Rix—play favorites from their repertoire and new releases from their forthcoming album, *Kingdom In My Mind*. (May 29; College of Charleston Cistern Yard)

Steep Canyon Rangers

This North Carolina-based sextet is known for bending and shaping the bluegrass aesthetic and wedding it to elements of pop, country, and folk rock to create something original. The Rangers released *Out in the Open* in 2018, affirming their place as one of the most versatile bands in contemporary American music. (June 3; College of Charleston Cistern Yard)

Fred Wilson: Afro Kismet

Featuring conceptual Artist Fred Wilson's most recent body of work, this exhibition juxtaposes contemporary objects of his own making and museum-quality artifacts to investigate the long-ignored presence of communities of African descent in Europe.
