Brandy Clark

A perennial critics' favorite who's been nominated for 17 Grammys, Brandy Clark is "universally revered" among fellow country songwriters, having penned hits for Kacey Musgraves, Band Perry, Darius Rucker, and Miranda Lambert (Los Angeles Times). But Nashville's sought-after tunesmith is coming into the spotlight after a whirlwind year that included her Broadway debut as co-composer/ lyricist of the Tony Award-winning musical Shucked, the release of her latest self-titled album (produced by close friend and collaborator, Brandi Carlile), and winning the Grammy Award for Best Americana Performance for her haunting hit ballad,

"Dear Insecurity."
